Physical

Approximately **5.6 million** refugees come from the wartorn country of **Syria**. This is the highest number of refugees compared to other countries. Most of the Syrians who are currently refugees remain in the **Middle East**. Turkey hosts 3.6 million, the largest number of refugees hosted by any country. Syrian refugees are also in Lebanon, Jordan, and Iraq as well as other countries around the world. During 2018, 1.4 million refugees returned home to Syria. Returnees face a daunting situation, including lack of infrastructure and services and danger from explosive devices.





Migration Time Line to Britain

Human

People often confuse the terms migrant, immigrant, refugee and asylum seeker.

A **migrant** is someone who is moving from place to place (within his or her country or across borders), usually for economic reasons such as seasonal work. An **immigrant** is someone who makes a conscious decision to leave his or her home and move to a foreign country with the intention of settling there. **Refugees** are **forced** to leave their native countries because of persecution or violence. An **asylum seeker** is someone whose claim for refugee status has not been determined legally and is seeking international protection from dangers in his or her home country.





Refugee - someone who is forced to leave their country and seek safety in another country.

Migration - the movement of a person or a group of people, to settle in another place, often across a boundary.

Persecution - unfair or cruel treatment over a long period of time because of race, religion, or political beliefs.

Asylum seeker - somebody who wants to find safety in another country and who has asked the Government of that country to allow them in as a refugee.

Civil war - a war between citizens of the same country.
