Spanish Civil war – different groups within Spain were fighting for control of the country.

Japan invaded both Manchuria and China in the 1930s as part of their expansion plans.

Italy invaded and took over Ethiopia in 1935.

In the late 1930s there were disagreements over the border between the USSR and Japan.

When Germany lost the First World War, they were forced to sign the Treaty of Versailles.

This treaty meant that:

- Germany had to take 'full responsibility' for starting the war
- Germany had to pay a fine of £6,000,000,000 to the winning countries
- Germany had to severely limit the size of their Army and Navy; they were allowed no airships or submarines
- Germany lost land to France, Belgium, Denmark and Poland
- 'Anschluss' (the uniting of German-speaking peoples) was forbidden

There was a worldwide economic depression – millions of people became unemployed and lost their homes and businesses.

In Germany, the situation was worse, and they experienced 'hyperinflation': money lost value so quickly that workers had to be paid daily. Eventually it was cheaper to burn money than use it to buy fuel.

In this time of difficulty, many people looked for someone to blame. In America, they blamed Communism; in Germany, they blamed the Jews.

Hitler came to power in 1933. He made huge promises to the German people.

Promises Hitler made included:

- Jobs for everybody
- An end to the depression
- A strong and stable government
- A '1,000-year Reich' where Germany would rule over Europe
- That Germany would reclaim 'lebensraum' (living space) from the land which was taken after WWI
- To re-build the army and navy
